## Fall Leaves

Poison ivy leaves turn colors earlier in the fall than most other plants. The leaves change from green to yellow, then to an intense red. Depending on the weather in your area of the country, the leaves may be just beginning to turn colors, or they may have already fallen to the ground.



One important thing to remember is the leaves and other parts of poison ivy, oak, and sumac plants remain toxic for years after they have died. Be careful while raking leaves and doing fall yard cleanup in areas where poison ivy is present. Wearing long pants, long sleeves, and gloves is important. Do not burn poison ivy plant material. The poison ivy toxin, urushiol, is stable at high temperatures. The plant particles dispersed in the smoke are allergenic and irritant.

After poison ivy's leaves have fallen to the ground, poison ivy vines can be identified by the hairy looking roots the vine uses to cling to the tree.
